Our Image—Feb. 1983 NA Way

The image of Narcotics Anonymous is something to which each of us can and does contribute. When attending conventions for our Fellowship as anonymous members, we leave an impression on the community. Our dress, our manner, our demeanor and our behavior is evaluated by the hotel staff, and those merchants we come in contact with during such events. We all know the obviously negative things that we have done that contribute negatively to the image of NA. There are some obvious things that we can do to contribute positively to the image of NA, not only at conventions or other events where we as a group of anonymous members have an impact on large communities, but also in our daily lives and our group efforts that have a long-lasting effect on our local communities.

I make a personal statement about who and what I am to my neighbors through the way I dress, the way I talk, the way I act, and the way I keep my house and property. Many of them saw me in my active addiction. Most were concerned. Several have asked what has happened to me, and I have at times mentioned that I attend NA meetings. I often indicate that attendance at those meetings is what has resulted in a change in my life. What the public sees, what my neighbors see, is the way I behave in society. Society places value on obeying the law. Society

places value on public expression of morality and immorality. How we behave when people are watching is a direct reflection on our personal program and can have an impact on the image of NA.

As secretary of a group, I told my story to the board of a local church in order to secure a meeting place. I shared the fact of my NA membership with these people. Then I spoke to them about the principle of anonymity and requested that they keep in strictest confidence what I had told them about my personal life. The condition in which we leave our meeting place on a weekly basis reflects very strongly the local image of our Fellowship. Periodically, our group holds community awareness meetings to inform concerned professionals and others who have routine contact with addicts seeking recovery. We inform them of the NA Program, what we offer, how and when we're available. We have personal contact with these professionals whenever possible and urge them to attend. How we appear to them reflects on the image of NA. The dignity and public acceptability of those NA members who conduct our "community awareness" meetings, again reflects on the image of NA.

My home group also sponsors an institutional meeting in a local rehabilitation center for addicted people. We co-sponsor this meeting with our area service H&I subcommittee. We have made a commitment to this institution to bring a meeting in on a weekly basis. We have made a further commitment that this meeting will carry the message of recovery from addiction as found in NA. How well we live up to that commitment reflects not only upon our group and the individual members attending, but also on the image of NA. Such efforts within the treatment community have the potential to affect NA as a whole. We try to be sure to live up to our commitment.

Oftentimes my personal rebellion and defiance leads me to dress, behave, and use language in a rebellious and defiant manner. This personal immaturity reassures me that I am still sick, still powerless over the disease of addiction. I'm confident that this local treatment community is tolerant of my growing up. I am grateful, however, for the awareness that my public immaturity can affect that Fellowship which I hold so dear. In public information and institution work on a group level, I feel that my personal opinions about recovery from addiction are not an appropriate message to carry.

My knowledge of and experience with the Twelve Steps and the Twelve Traditions of NA are the most appropriate sharing in such situations. Our Basic Text provides sufficient guidance in

these matters. It seems that study of this Basic Text can help me express the "WE" of our program. Appropriate use of personal experiences which illustrate the material in our Basic Text constitutes responsible sharing in PI and H&I work. These are some things that come quickly to mind in terms of the image that we project to the public at the group level and as individual members. Many events are sponsored by groups, areas, and regions to help us learn about and have fun in our recovery. I can't think of any such event where some member of the local community is not watching our behavior. How would we have them view our Fellowship? How can we help them see it as it is? Anonymous



You Just Have To Do It

Let me begin my story many years ago back when a young me was around, oh 18 or so...wild as buck and not a care in the world, then I got into the game, drinking, smoking, then after many years of doing everything I could, I started firing harder drugs, that road lead me down a dark time in my life. Losing it all, nearly OD'd twice and still didn't care because I wanted to die. I was tired of feeling guilt shame and remorse. I stole anything from anyone I could in order to get my next high. I remember getting ready to take the third hit of dope that would kill me when the Topeka Fire Department, EMS, and the Topeka Police Department rolled up on me two years ago and basically saved my life. I was transferred to the ER where I was kept for three days, then was transported to Salina, KS where I did 28 days of inpatient treatment. Has the road to recovery been an easy road? NO, but I was willing to take the hits and keep moving forward, so I did.

Today, I am 2 years 4 months and 11 days clean*, addiction isn't easy to walk away from, matter of fact it's the hardest thing I ever had to do. You have to leave those behind that still use, surround yourself with good people, and walk the dreams you have off when you wake up with sweat pouring, hearts racing, and remind yourself that's not who I am anymore, and cage that demon back up.

I was asked the other day if I could change anything in my life would I, my reply was no, for the reason my past life has shaped and molded me to be the man I am today. It was training as I call it to take on what I do now. I see it every day where I work, so I know how to approach and deal with those situations. The recovery road is not an easy road, but one that has been well worth it for me. I stand strong today. I fight against it, and you can to, you just have to do it.

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Lessons of NA recovery

What am I supposed to learn today? That is the question I ask in my prayers to the God of my understanding pretty much every morning. I learned early in my recovery in Narcotics Anonymous that I was not prepared to live, life on life terms, clean. In most situations I was paralyzed with indecision due to fear of an action that was presented as the solution. Surrendering a decision to a loving higher power's will with a shallow faith was more than I could bear. I knew in my heart if I did not change I would not stay clean. But could I actually change who I was? Through answered prayers, paying attention to everyone speaking at a meeting, working the steps, talking with my sponsor; I waited for the moments of clarity. The answers came as I completed the action required on my part. My faith deepened.

Day after day, month after month, year after year, my life in recovery transformed me into a decent human being that carried a message of recovery, hope, and freedom from active addiction. Goals and dreams never before realized unfolded in my recovery.

Today, I again stand at the door of indecision and fear. Not because I am not willing to change, but because I have a new set of problems that recovery in NA gave me. I have responsibilities and obligations I obtained in recovery. With all credit to NA and my higher power, I don't want to use today. Today I am troubled with how to meet my obligations and responsibilities. I know the actions to take and I take them. The clarity has not come as easily as it has in the past. So I ask, What am I not willing to turn over or surrender? Are my problems so complex the simple spiritual principles of the Narcotics Anonymous program cannot help me? For me today, part of the answer is "Trust the process of NA recovery".

I challenge every person who reads the MAN newsletter to write just one page about your recovery in Narcotics Anonymous. Keep the MAN Newsletter alive with fresh insight. Share what is in your heart. Don't worry about if others that read it will find it profound. If you write it about your recovery, it is profound! We can't save our ass and our face at the same time.

It's not about standing on the street corners telling everyone who will listen. It's not about going door to door telling people about a life saving place. It's about showing others a better way to live by being a Basic Text others can read. It's about being the best I can be even when i know no one is watching. Its about sharing how I lived through the hell I created and not had to use even when I wanted to.




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
