

#### MY MOTHER WAS A SAINT

Just ask anyone who knows her personally or who lives in Columbus. She has a reputation twenty years past that still stands in that town. She has a smile, and a kind work or deed for any that may cross her path and is humble almost to the point of self degradation. Many are proud to know her and I am proud to call her Mom. Her husband died a drawn out and grueling death and left her with a seven year old boy to raise. No, she has not had it easy; in fact looking at her, you wouldn't know she had had it hard. The town once voted to give me a bicycle because they loved her so much. The runner up had more relatives around than a dog has fleas, but their love for Mom defeated even that large lobby (in fact I suspect even half of the relatives voted for her!) She married a bastard after six years on her own; ooh...that may be too strong a term. Suffice it to say that opposites do attract and in this case united. I don't really think she realized all his bad points when she married him; but then again, it would not be unlike her to save the world or some unknown woman from him and sacrifice herself. Any way he had the qualities she wanted in a step-father for her son; and if a sacrifice was in order, then it was indeed a small price to pay. In my entire life, I can only recall my Mom getting into conflicts with two people. One was her husband, of course, and the other was most certainly a lying and insane woman. The most important thing in my mother's life, other than remaining a saint, is her son. She thinks he is, or would like for him to be, a saint too. He does not want to be a saint, has never been a saint and will never be a saint. They almost had him convinced that he was a saint too, at about twelve years old and it took him many, many years before he realized that it was alright not to be a saint.and many more years before he realized that it was alright to disagree with or disappoint a saint. (I say "They" because I believe Mom came from a long line of saints -- but then that's another story ... or maybe it's not). He still feels guilty when he disappoints his saint, or rather he feels like he should feel guilty; (she usually has a very valid point, saints are like that) but he quite often

doesn't any more--he has a choice. He likes himself and generally doesn't go out of his way to behave saintly--or unsaintly. Regardless of what he does, his saint will always love him and she will probably always think that he is a saint too. She will probably always be a martyr for sainthood because its hard to return to just being human after forty years of being a saint; and she is afraid. And I will always love her and I will always be there and my heart will always weep for her burden and she will always be more than and less than a saint to me, she will be simply Mom.

#### BREATH OF AIR



#### "TOO MUCH TIME ON YOUR HANDS"

Since I sobered up I've been priviledged to do volunteer work for the local chapter of The American Red Cross. This was my sponsor's idea. "Too much time on your hands" she said. Well, let me tell you I had just a small resentment about that! How dare she?!!!! Anyway, I was just a little willing to do what she had suggusted, so off I went to see what I could do as a volunteer for my community. When I went for the interview, the lady in charge told me it was ok that I was a recovering addict. Imagine that, someone from the "outside" telling me it was O K. It felt good to share with someone about myself and our program of recovery. I did however, tell her as honestly as I could that I was volunteering at the suggestion of my sponsor and in that sense I was doing it for myself and if it helped the community, fine. Selfish program, right? Right!!

Well, it's been a most rewarding experience. Oh, most days its not really exciting, but I do feel better when I get back home from the Red Cross and know that I've helped someone, some way; but mostly I've really helped my self-image and I needed that. To know that I can be useful and have purpose in my life is a wonderfully, peaceful feeling. It takes me useful of myself: I also make 12 step calls when asked. I've got to give it away in order to keep it.

By God's grace I've been clean and sober for 15 months and have begun to sense what my new way of life has to offer in the way of spiritual growth and development.

To have a sponsor I can disagree with at times is O K. However,

it was important that I started listening to her "experience, strength, and hope because I knew I wanted what she had and I became willing to listen and learn. Sometimes the remnents of the rebel in me crop up and make it difficult for me to listen to whats best, but today I have the program to get me back on the right track and on to recovery.

You see, my sponsor would never ask me to do something that she was not willing to do herself, or had already done. She had done volunteer work two and a half years before me because her sponsor thought it would be good for too. My sponsor shares with me what worked for her, and for that I'm grateful.

As addicts we don't do well with unstructured time. This is a program of action, not a program of thinking. I had to act like I wanted to do some things I really didn't want to do, until I realized I really enjoyed those things or felt the benefit of the action taken.

I believe our recovery is a gift from God, and that what we do with our time in recovery is our gift to God.
