
# MID-AMERICA



### THE TWELVE STEPS OF NARCOTICS ANONYMOUS.

- We admitted that we were powerless over our addiction, that our lives had become unmanageable.
- We came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.
- 3. We made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.
- We made a searching and fearless moral inventory of ourselves.
- We admitted to God, to ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs.
- We were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- 7. We humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.
- 8. We made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- We made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- We continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- 11. We sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
- 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to addicts, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

One of our earliest involvements with others in N.A. begins with sponsorship. I'd like to share what has helped this addict in sponsorship, both in sponsoring others and in being sponsored. I don't have all of the answers. These are just my own thoughts based on personal experience.

Sponsorship is a two-way street; it helps both parties involved. The sponsor uses his/her experience, strength and hope to help another addict. Sponsors can't pay your bills, or get your marriage back together. But they can be someone you can confide in. As the N.A. Basic Text states, "the therapeutic value of one addict helping another is without parallel."

#### Seeking a sponsor

Check out various meetings among different N.A. groups and see who the winners are. Ask yourself:"Do I want what they have?"

'Take the risk and talk to people. Remem— Ser, we must be willing to go to any Lengths. It is recommended that a good sponsor should be clear at least a year and seem to be enjoying it.

i sponsor should be of the same sex. This reduces the problem of distractions that may interfere with the newcomer's program.

 nake sure this person will be available and will make the commitment necessary to sponsor you.

Talk with this person first to see what you both expect out of sponsorship.

- Make sure this sponsor introduces you to others in the fellowship; get their phone numbers. Bemember, your particular sponsor may not always be home.

\* Be willing to take your sponsor's suggestions If the suggestion is not clear, then get clarification. You may not always agree, but remember that your sponsor has been clean longer. Talk about it if you don't agree, and share your feelings, thoughts and ideas.

If you make an appointment with your sponsor, SHOW UP! If you are unable to make your appointment, be courteous enough to call so they don't worry.

 Don't just have a sponson in name only; USE THEM! Call them often enough to let them know how you are, in good times and bad times. It you have a problem, talk to them and share it. Don't keep anything inside.

Yes, you can have more than one sponsor, to get a wide variety of experience, strength and \* Stress the importance of going to meetings, hope. Be careful; don't tell one sponsor one thing and another sponsor something entirely different. Get honest and try to be consistent.

\* Trust your sponsor. If for some reason they betray your trust (and sometimes this may happen), it's okau to seek another sponsor. When appropriate, tell them why you are seeking another sponson; it may help their program.

- It's never too late to find a sponsor.

#### Being a sponsor

\* Show by example what being clean has done for you; work the steps, use YOUR sponsor, and live the program.

 \* Encourage open-mindedness about N.A., especially if the newcomer isn't sure whether he/she is an addict or not.

 $^st$  Introduce the newcomer to others in the fellowship, and encourage them to get phone numbers.

\* Stress the importance of working the Twelve Steps.

\* Don't be a "gestapo sponsor." Don't give orders; make suggestions. Use the N.A. text to back up the suggestions you are giving. This helps to give the suggestion more merit.

\* Keep an open mind and keep your ego out of it. Be understanding, patient, and willing to devote the time necessary to sponsorship.

\* Don't pretend to be right all of the time. Admit, "I don't know," and find someone who does. This is helpful when you find the addict who may need some professional counseling. Encourage the newcomer to utilize any and all support systems available to his recovery.

\* Don't be insulted if the newcomer seeks out others for experience, strength and hope, or finds another sponsor. This is the true test of readiness for sponsorship: the willingness to place principles before personalities. Be okay with that.

\* Encourage the newcomer to lean on the ргодгат, not on you.

As soon as possible, encourage the newcomer to get into service and group activities.

\* Stress the importance of the Twelve Traditions.

no matter how long you are clean.

After having a session with the newcomer, be sure to thank them for helping you to stay clean one more day (because they have).

\* Try not to call the person that you sponsor a "pigeon", it is a negative term implying someone who waddles around and defecate on their sponsor. Use terms like "sponsee", or "friend" or something more positive.

\* Take the person you sponsor on a Twelfth Step call when they are ready. This will help both of you. R.B.,Florida

When I hit bottom and found Narcotics Anonymous, I was hurting deep within. I was in severe pain, and the drugs were no longer easing it. I could not live with drugs or without them. The disease of addiction had beaten me to a pulp. I felt like an alien and lived like an animal. Everything about me was phoney; I did not know what reality was. I lived in a fantasy world of nothingness. My family was baffled and confused. I was physically, mentally, and spiritually bankrupt. I hated myself.

I did not know what to expect when I walked into a basement of a church and attended my first N.A. meeting. I do not even remember what was said, but I do remember the welcome I received from those six recovering addicts seated around

the table.

They welcomed me with open arms, regardless of the wreckage of my past. They accepted me unconditionally and treated me as a human being. They even told me to keep coming back! They supplied me with N.A. literature and gave me their phone numbers. I was attracted. And it was this attraction that helped me surrender and find recovery. I am grateful for it, because today I have over four years clean.

After attending several meetings, I began to hear about the importance of sponsorship. I got the information pamphlet on sponsorship and read it, so that I would know what to look for in a sponsor. After becoming familiar with it, I was ready to find a sponsor.

The first stumbling block for me was fear. I had always been afraid of people, and carried the fear of rejection everywhere I went. I had to address this fear before I could get on with my recovery. When I approached a certain individual to ask him to sponsor me, I expected the answer to be "no." To my surprise, he said "yes."

Now I had a sponsor, somebody I could turn to, someone to share my problems with. The sponsor I chose centered his recovery in the N.A. program. He practiced spiritual principles in his life, he was an active member of the group, and he carried the message of

десоvery.

I wanted what my sponsor had. I knew that in order for me to find it I would have to use him. The night I asked him, he sat down and shared his beliefs about sponsorship with me. He made it clear to me that it was my responsibility to contact him when I was hurting or needed to talk to him. From that night on, I began a relationship with him that would be an essential part of my recovery—"the therapeutic value of one addict helping another" had begun.

Sponsorship is a relationship that went beyond my distorted ideas of what relationships were supposed to be like. First of all, it was with another male. Secondly, it was built on sound spiritual principles. My relationship with my sponsor was the first one that had a meaning and purpose to it. Honesty, love and

acceptance were the main reasons.

In the past, I'd placed conditions on everything. Sponsorship is unconditional. It is two addicts getting together and sharing freely about recovery from the disease of addiction. It is not a one-way but a two-way street. My relationship with my sponsor has been a journey

into the light of reality.

A relationship with a sponsor is the road to a personal involvement with the Twelve Steps of N.A. My sponsor taught me, both by example and word, how to work the steps. No matter what type of problems I would share with him, he would point out the solution in the steps. My sponsor never turned me away. He was always there, regardless of the circumstances. It did not matter what time of day it was. He allowed me to make my own mistakes, and was there after I made them to help me through the pain. He never forced me to do anything I did not want to do. He loved me well before I could love myself or anyone else. He forgave me well before I could forgive. He cared for me well before I could care.

My sponsor showed me living proof that recovery is possible for any addict willing to practice the principles that make recovery possible. He gave it away-to me- in order to keep

it himself.

There are many things I have received from my sponsor. I can remember thanking my sponsor many times for the help he'd given me; his response was that I, too, had helped him tremendously.

That amazed me.

He has helped me find the N.A. way of life. He has shown me the need to get involved and help carry the message of recovery to addicts who still suffer. What started as sponsorship has developed into a deep and intimate friendship that can not have a price tag attached to it.

I am grateful for sponsorship. I know that if it were not for my sponsor I would have faced a rougher road. My sponsor is a gift from God.

If you don't have a sponsor ask someone and if you haven't become a sponsor yet, Look forward to it. It will be a wonderful growing experience.

In Tradition Six, it states that "an N.A. group ought never endorse, finance or lend the N.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise." It states in the Basic Text that an "outside enterprise includes any agency or business venture."

These stores and literature outlets are out to make a profit and I see the profit being made on the N.A. name.

In Tradition Eleven it that "our policy is attraction rather than promotion." It is important to reach as many people as possible, but it is imperative for our protection that we are careful about any literature that may reach the public hands. Once this literature is in these outlets it will be out of N.A.'s hands on how they will be promoting it.

be heard.

## THE TWELVE TRADITIONS OF NARCOTICS ANONYMOUS.

- Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on N.A. unity.
- For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern.
- The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop using.
- Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or N.A. as a whole.
- Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry the message to the addict who still suffers.
- An N.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the N.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property or prestige divert us from our primary purpose.
- Every N.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.
- Narcotics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.
- N.A., as such, ought never be organized, but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.
- Narcotics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the N.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
- Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.
- Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

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
