- We were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.
- 7. We humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings.
- 8. We made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- We made direct amends to such people wherever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.
- We continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.
- 11. We sought through prayer and meditation to improve our conscious contact with God as we understood Him, praying only for knowledge of His will for us and the power to carry that out.
- 12. Having had a spiritual awakening as a result of these steps, we tried to carry this message to addicts, and to practice these principles in all our affairs.

I was also getting suicidal, which had recently prompted me to actually call one of the four sponsors I had collected in treatment. This new clean life had shown me no serenity.

Being a hardcore nature lover, when my sponsor said "CAMPOUT", I was more than ready. It was kind of a pre-summer campout. Either in late April or early May, and it got cold! It was so cold around 3:00 A.M., I had to get out of my sleeping bag and tent and huddle by the fire to stay warm. I wasn't alone.

It was the Augusta Group's campout. It was on private land way out in the boonies. It was a real small campout, and that was fine with me. Everyone was extremely nice, but I was in total awe of these N.A. people, alot of them had been clean for a number of years! I felt like a kid who got to play with the grown-ups.

We had the best bonfire I had ever seen. I guess it must have been time to clear the land, trees were hauled in with a tractor, and we burned them all. We found two beautiful young hawks, not yet able to fly, kittens and wildflowers. I have had wildfowers by my tent flap at every campout ever since.

I discovered Serenity Spots, also. The first was a big flat rock, with a tree growing around it and branching over a crystal clear stream. Beautiful. Peaceful. Quiet. Serene. It was impossible not to believe in a Higher Power there. I slowed down and talked to God and listened long enough to hear an answer. And I started to understand serenity. Later I followed a stream deep into the woods. There I found a pond in a small clearing and a deer. We watched each other for quite some time and shared the pond together. I am almost sure the deer was in conscious contact with God also.

Best of all were the people. The relaxation, the caring and sharing. The ease of it all. Everyone was so nice and they did not want anything. But I did! I finally saw something worth wanting.

Some time later, I was at the Newton pre-campout campout. I met some neat people there. I was away from home in the Fall, and those people took me in and treated me like an old friend. I found out the program is there, where ever you go.

Before I knew it, it was time for the big one. The Fourth of July Regional Campout. We were almost the first campers to arrive. Tents started popping up, this time I knew alot of the people. I was starting to feel like I belonged. The next day really blew my little mind. Instead of tents scattered here and there, suddenly there was a sea of tents. So many people!!!!I followed my sponsor, it seemed she introduced me to hundreds of people.

The meetings were wonderful too. Having meetings out of doors seems to greatly increase spirituality and trust. Especially at night around a campfire. I started to get in touch with things I didn't even know were there inside of me. I felt safe. There were no dangers there. No stealing, everything was shared. No con-games or fights, there was truth and love. No drugs, everyone could dance and play without them. The only sad or painful time I experienced that weekend was leaving. 





### THE TWELVE TRADITIONS OF NARCOTICS ANONYMOUS.

- Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends on N.A. unity.
- For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority—a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants, they do not govern.
- The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop using.
- Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or N.A. as a whole.
- Each group has but one primary purpose—to carry the message to the addict who still suffers.
- An N.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the N.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property or prestige divert us from our primary purpose.
- Every N.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.
- Narcotics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.
- N.A., as such, ought never be organized, but we may create service boards or committees directly responsible to those they serve.
- Narcotics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the N.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.
- Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion; we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, and films.
- Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.
