

Dear MAN,

Hello to all my recovering brothers and sisters with my recovery birthday nearing and the convention just passed I have done a lot of thinking about my progress in recovery and how important you all are to me. I definitely couldn't have made it alone.

In reviewing my recovery and also my using days. I have become very grateful for the life I have today. Even if I don't get things just how I'd like them, it is much better than anything I know in my days.

I don't like to sit around and tell war stories trying to see who was the sickest, but I do need to honestly review and share the hell my life had become. I have a tendency to become ungrateful quickly and it usually takes a good dose of the reality of my past to make me see just how good I've got it today.

There are times when I wish I could feel the loathing and hatred I had for myself back then, just for a few seconds so I could have it fresh in my mind. It scares me how difficult it can be sometimes, for me to have a clear and truthful recollection of the shadow of a human I'd become in my using. Sometimes it seems like it was all a dream and someone else did all those insane things and hated himself.

I would love to have a film of myself in active addiction to look at when I'm in my self-pity.

but, thanks to you all and the 12 Steps, I don't live with that self-loathing and hopelessness today. I do still live with an aspect of my disease called denial.

In my using, it was obvious to people around me that I was out of control. There were even times when I would wake up with no money or drugs and have to live with the gnawing reality of what I was, or wonder in fear at what I'd done this time. Someone always was willing to tell me all about what I'd done though. I hated hearing the truth because it poked holes in my wall of denial when they told me what i was really like. I preferred to forget it as soon as possible and to deny it ever happened. I just wanted to get high again and slip into my delusions of grandever and coolness.

I heard a saying that describes me well.
"I used to think I was a slow learner, now I know I'm just a fast forgetter."

I know I'm an addict and I can't control my use of drugs. I also know my disease is always with me, waiting for it's opportunity to take me over.

My denial isn't so blatant as it was in using. Today it lets me get comfortable, get on with life's daily tasks, school, T.V....

I didn't think I was sick when using, and there's times I don't think I'm sick enough to warrant going to a meeting still. Is that denial?


The farther it is from my last usage, the easier it is for this subtle form of denial to smooth over the past and make it just a little harder to recall the truth about my addiction.

That's why I need to be at meetings regularly, I need to hear newcomers stories, and I need to work at digging up my story honestly to share with anyone in need of it.

My past is extremely important. It's not just a war story, it's a common bond that any addict can understand, whether clean for years or hours. Thanks.

Dear MAN,

Hi! I'm an addict, just like you. Though for a long time. I thought I was different, unique. I use to go to meetings and concentrate on how different I was form each person who shared. I listened for how much vou used and how insane your life was, and if it was "worse" than mine or not "quite as bad". I didn't think you could relate. That was my way of keeping you at a distance. I got a sponsor and realized that wasn't completely true, vet I continued to look at our differences. Then I got a sponsoree. And as she shared, I could really relate. Our using was different as well as our lives, though the feelings, the yearning to stay clean, and the struggles were very similar. It was then I opened myself up.

There's a part in one of our readings that says, "We are not interested in what or how much you used or who connections were. what you have done in the past, how much or how little you have, but only in what you want to do about your problem and how we can help". I realized that our pasts are all different, yet the pain of our addiction is often very much alike. I began to look at our "similarities instead of our differences," and my whole outlook on recovery changed. Today, I have more friends because I've opened myself up. I now have new ways of dealing with "life on life's terms", and my recovery has changed for the better. I now share when I struggle and know that though the situations may be different, you can relate.

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience.


Our leaders are out trusted servants: they do not govern."


