The Mid-America Region was formed July 7th, 1979 at Camp Hawk, near Newton, KS. This event was put together by groups in Kansas, mainly Wichita, Newton, and Topeka. It drew however, groups from Nebraska and lowa as well as other groups throughout Kansas. The newly formed region created three areas, North and South in Kansas and East in Nebraska. The lowa group joined the Nebraska East area.

The campout this historical meeting was held at has continued every 4th of July weekend, with the exception of 2003 when it was moved one week off as to not to interfere with NA's 50th anniversary world convention. It has always remained a free event, no registration fee, no primitive camping fee, and always includes at least one free meal, typically more.

V----Vital-----Be willing to make recovery very essential to our daily lives


E----Encourage-----Encourage yourself with hope, faith, and willingness

To give back – to be of service. I followed these suggestions and I continued to stay clean. I still do these things today. What I find disturbing about service work is that I believe a lot of people have forgotten why they serve and/or who they serve.

I believe that there has been a breakdown somewhere in the communication through the years. I was taught by my first sponsor, and I have passed it on to my sponsee's through the years.

The spirit of giving back to the fellowship is to give freely what was so freely given to us. We are trusted servants to those in this fellowship. It is not about recognition,


power or position. It is about doing for others as they did for us.

I look around this fellowship in our region and I see a great many addicts who exemplify this principle. However, I see too many who "serve" NA without this principle. So how does this reflect on us - are we attracting the newcomer, or are we chasing them away? Are we staying true to the principles, traditions and concepts of this fellowship, or are we using our place in the service structure as a way to create chaos and destruction? Do you know deep in your heart why and who you serve?

So I ask you my fellow addicts, are you a living example of this program? Are you giving back what was so freely given to you? Are you expecting things or are you remembering that recovery is a daily gift given to us all by a loving Higher Power?

CBDM = Complicating?

"Consensus Based Decision Making" or CBDM ultimately derived from the inventory world services started in 1993. In 1996 Resolutions A thru G, Vision, and Mission Statements were approved, the first resolution, or Resolution "A", included Consensus Based Decision in it's objective. While all other resolutions were implemented within a few years, Resolution "A" was left to the fellowship to set an implementation timeline. That resolution involved reducing the size of the WSC, providing equal, worldwide participation. Jump ahead six WSC's to 2004, where Consensus Based Decision making was added to the "lowpriority approved projects" list. That carried to the 2006 conference where a motion for the World Board to reinstate the CBDM at WSC 2008 passed.

At the 2008 WSC, CBDM was put to the test, but still needed much fine tuning. The 6th Edition Basic Text passed at that WSC though, so it wasn't all bad. Since that conference the WSC has resorted back to a customized version of Robert's Rules of Order.

There are good merits to the CBDM process, and it can even be labeled for the outcome as well as the process. But realistically, for most service bodies, discussion and voting can yield the same results. My experience has shown that if your service body complicated voting in the "old system", then you are going to complicate CBDM as well. The initial five color card system was testament to that.

Most service bodies dropped the white card, signifying surrender, that you have no opinion. The four that remain are green for "Assent"; yellow for "Assent with Reservations"; orange for "Stand Aside"; and red for "Block".

With Roberts Rules of Order, no service body that I have served on, including the World Service Conference, have ever used those rules by the book. As stated above, WSC used a customized, or simplified version, taking into consideration the nature of our fellowship and group conscience. The Mid-America Region and most ASCs follow an even more simplified version.

In both versions of reaching a conscience, the key is the facilitator or chairperson. When I held the RSC chairperson position, I would want to hear from the RCMs that either voted against or abstained on the business at hand. Hearing all aspects has always been in our process, if utilized. That also applied to the times I acted as facilitator between two committees or regions in times of crisis.

There might be some service bodies that follow the "limited discussion, three pros and three cons" process, they are only cheating the fellowship they serve and I could imagine there would be resentments surrounding that structure. Allowing questions and comments to reach a full understanding with all participating is imperative in both versions as well. A clear understanding is what reaches a true conscience with any

structure.

The difference in voting varies, Roberts Rules version usually has 2/3 for policy or money matters and simple majority for the rest. CBDM can range from 100% to 80% using any vote (card) but the "block". Some might also argue that there is no voting in CBDM, but voting can happen in many ways. Whether you raise your arm, speak, write it down, or simply keep quiet, your vote can be tallied, if even for a straw poll. Which version is best? Well obviously the version that works for you is best. The Mid-America Region uses a simple version of Roberts Rules on the main business meeting, but incorporates CBDM during subcommittee meetings.

What CBDM did incorporate in its structure is spiritual traits that should have always been used anyway, but sometimes neglected. Principles like leadership, integrity, humility, trust, openmindedness, cooperation, and accountability.
